Creating an Annotated Bibliography

An *annotated bibliography* is a list of references and a brief summary of each one. For each source, list the reference, using correct formatting (see below), and then answer the questions:

- What is the overall topic of this source?
- Is it a primary or a secondary source?
- What are the main points/findings discussed?
- What particular part of this source is useful to you?

Formatting References:

Journal:

Author Name and Initials. Year. Title of the study. *Journal* Volume Number: page range.

One or two authors: Underwood DR and Jones BW. 2003. The evolution of habitable zones during stellar lifetimes and its implications on the search for extraterrestrial life. *International Journal of Astrobiology* 2: 289-299.

Three or more authors: Struik PC, et al. 2008. Plant neurobiology and green plant intelligence: science, metaphors and nonsense. *Journal of the Science of Food and Agriculture* 88: 363-370.

Book:

Author Name and Initials. Year. Book Title. Publisher.

Chapter in a Book:

Author Name and Initials. Year. Chapter Title. In: Editor's Name and Initials (ed) Book Title. Publisher, page range.
